Risky Birth of Beccles Lido 2006-09

The Beccles lido was constructed in 1959 on the site of an older bathing pool. Prior to that swimmers used a fenced off part of the River Waveney in the town. Heating was installed in 1975. In 2004 Waveney District Council announced plans to close the lido and to build an indoor swimming pool.

In 2006, owned by Waveney District Council, the lido was loosing customers, loosing structure and maintenance. A prison like fence was erected around it to cut costs on life-guards. Friends of Beccles Outdoor Pool campaign started in 2006 to maintain the pool.

2007 Beccles Lido Ltd, led by Shawn Crowley, re-positioned the view, with an ambitious aim to lease or own it.

2008 BLL applied for a large British Gas grant. Shawn Crowley, Graham Elliott and a Catholic priest rocked up to make a presentation (the salesman, hippie and priest)

The didn't win the initial grant funding, but did the runner up which in effect funded new boiler, pool liner, cover, and solar panels. They still didn't own it.

In 2009, Waveney District Council agreed to sell (not lease) Beccles Lido to BLL (at the same time as they decided they would no longer manage Halesworth Open Air Pool).

The chairman of Beccles Lido, Maureen Saunders, won a community pride award in July 2009 for her work campaigning for the lido and establishing the management company.

Beccles Public Hall

Owned by Waveney District council who wanted to divest themselves of it.

In 2011, there was a rallying call to the community for volunteers to come forward and help save the Public Hall.

District councillor Graham Elliott was instrumental in helping to save the building as he made it a central part of his election campaign, therefore spreading the word to all the community.

Graham approached BLL, who at first said no - for their own good reasons. However they later agreed, conditional upon Beccles Public Hall having their own team to manage the project. BLL would be the official umbrella organisation.

February 2013 - The Public Hall was purchased by Beccles Lido Limited (BLL), a registered charity, and is run by it's own board of Trustees.

Marsh View Direct Action

Spring 2011 The first direct action of the Green Party

A landowner wanted to cut down a local woodland, near Marsh View.

The Council were helpless - it would take too long to get a Tree Preservation Order to save the woodland.

The Green Party, led by Graham Elliott, mustered some activists, and they stood in front of the contractors bulldozer.

The contractor walked away.

The landowner backed off.

The woodland stands today- with a TPO on it.
